    - 1. We can all still grow
    - 2. One of the most significant ways prayer
      - a. Prayer is one of the challenging aspects of the Christian life for me
    - 3. Years ago did a study of the prayers of the NT
      - a. Discovered I didn't pray like them!
      - b. My prayers were weak
      - c. Often self-centered
      - d. Lacking in theological substance didn't reflect enough on whom I was praying to
      - e. Especially discovered that my prayer priorities were not the same as the NT authors

### II. The Prayers of Jesus

## A. What Jesus Taught

- 1. So-called "Lord's Prayer"
  - a. Really, our Lord's instruction on prayer
  - b. We often use it liturgically; sometimes even sing it
  - c. But really meant as a pattern or a framework for all legitimate prayer
- 2. If you analyze this instruction, and analyze the prayers of the NT (and even the psalms!) you'll discover many echoes and allusions
- 3. Address: Our Father
- 4. Petitions God-centered
  - a. God's name hallowed
  - b. Kingdom come
  - c. Will be done
- 5. Petitions Human-centered
  - a. Daily bread (provisions)
  - b. Forgiveness
    - (1) As we forgive!

- c. Temptation
  - (1) Self-awareness of our inherent weakness
- B. How Jesus Prayed
  - 1. Two examples
    - 2. John 17 Jesus' Priestly Prayer
      - a. Climax of Jesus' final time with disciples Olivet discourse
      - b. Relationship with the world
      - c. Saved from the World
      - d. Safe in the World
        - (1) Sanctification by the Word
        - (2) Preservation of the Saints
      - e. Unified for the World
        - (1) Unity as with the Trinity
        - (2) Basis for the world recognizing Jesus came from God
- C. Move now to the prayers of Paul
  - 1. More like our own
    - 2. Still challenging
      - a. Some of the ways my prayer life has been affected have been the prayers of Paul
      - b. Have become the basis of how I pray for others
    - 3. Challenge us to evaluate our times of intercessions
      - a. Corporate
      - b. Personal

## III. The Prayers of Paul

- A. Text Philippians 1.3-11
  - 1. Philippians 1:3–11 (ESV)
    - a. 3 I thank my God in all my remembrance of you,
    - b. 4 always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy,
    - c. 5 because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now.
    - d. 6 And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.
    - e. 7 It is right for me to feel this way about you all,
    - f. because I hold you in my heart, for you are all partakers with me of grace,
    - g. both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel.
    - h. 8 For God is my witness, how I yearn for you all with the affection of Christ Jesus.
    - i. 9 And it is my prayer that your love may abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment,
    - j. 10 so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ,

- k. 11 filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.
- B. Attitude and Approach
  - 1. Philippians 1:3 (ESV)
    - a. 3 I thank my God in all my remembrance of you...
  - 2. Thanks God
    - a. In all my remembrance every Time
      - (1) Indicates Frequency of prayers
    - b. Remembers them
      - (1) Indicates occasion of prayers
      - (2) Ex: Cotton Mather (diary, February, 1684)
      - (3) "When I have been sitting in a Room full of People, at a Funeral, where they take not much Liberty or Talk, and where yett much Time is most unreasonably lost, I have usually sett my Witts a work, to contrive agreeable Benedictions, for each Person in the Company.
      - (4) "In passing along the Street, I have sett myself to bless thousands of persons, who never knew that I did it; with secret Wishes, after this manner sent unto Heaven for them."
      - (5) "Upon the sight of:
        - (a) A tall man: Lord, give that Man, High Attainments in Christianity; lett him fear God, above many.
        - (b) Children at Play: Lord, lett not these Children always forget the Work, which they came into the World upon.
        - (c) A Very little Man: Lord, bestow great Blessings upon that man, and above all, thy Christ, the greatest of blessings.
        - (d) A Man carrying a Burden: Lord, help this Man to carry a burdened Soul, unto his Lord-Redeemer.
        - (e) A Man on Horseback: Lord, thy Creatures do serve that man; help him to serve his Maker.
        - (f) Young People: Lord, help these Persons to remember their Creator in the Dayes of their Youth.
        - (g) Young Gentlewomen: Lord make 'em wise Virgins, as the polish'd Stones of thy Temple
        - (h) A Shop-keeper, busy in the Shop: Lord, lett not the World cause that Person to neglect the one thing that is needful.
        - (i) A Man, who going by me took no Notice of mee: Lord, help that Man, to take a due Notice of the Lord Jesus Christ, I pray thee."
  - 3. Philippians 1:4 (ESV) —

- a. 4 always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy...
- 4. Prayers = Requests
  - a. Joy emotional state of mind when praying
  - b. Always frequency of joyful praying for the saints
  - c. When you pray for the saints, do you always have a joyful attitude?
- 5. Philippians 1:5 (ESV)
  - a. 5 because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now.
- 6. Partnership in gospel =  $\frac{\text{koinonia}}{\text{reason for Paul's joy}}$ 
  - a. Koinonia fellowship; cf Chinese Church always talked about others in the church as co-workers
  - b. From first day until now Consistency of their partnership
  - c. Do we think of the history we have had together as believers in this place, the fellowship we share in the gospel, as occasion for joyful praying?
- 7. Philippians 1:6 (ESV)
  - a. 6 And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.
- 8. Sure =  $\frac{\text{Confident}}{\text{Confident}}$ , persuaded
  - a. He = God
  - b. Began = God initiated our salvation; why we can pray with such thanksgiving!
  - c. Bring it to completion = epiteleo finish, complete
  - d. At the day of Christ until He returns
  - e. Observation
    - (1) Paul's confidence arises from his observation of the faithful, consistent response of the Philippians
    - (2) However, his confidence is not in the Philippians but in God
    - (3) He is persuaded that what he sees in them is the work of God, and his confidence is that if God began it, He will complete it
  - f. Would Paul have the same confidence in us?
    - (1) Do we pray for others who are like the Philippians in this way?
- 9. Philippians 1:7 (ESV)
  - a. 7 It is right for me to feel this way about you all,
  - b. because I hold you in my heart,
  - c. for you are all partakers with me of grace,
  - d. both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel.
- 10. In imprisonment and defense of the gospel Paul's circumstances
  - a. In spite of his circumstances, he still has them in his heart!
  - b. Philippians share in God's grace with him, no matter what

- (1) Didn't matter what happened to Paul, the Philippians would be faithful partakers of his ministry with him
- c. This verifies legitimacy of Paul's feelings
  - (1) Sometimes feelings are mistaken
  - (2) Paul received confirmation about feelings
- 11. Philippians 1:8 (ESV)
  - a. 8 For God is my witness, how I yearn for you all with the affection of Christ Jesus.
- 12. Paul's desire for them
  - a. Pastor's heart really desires to see them
  - b. Affection of Christ Jesus
    - (1) Affection = bowels (lit, spleen), seat of gentler affections of Jews
    - (2) Of Christ greater love has no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends
    - (3) Paul has adopted that kind of love
- 13. All of this puts Paul in a position to pray for his fellow believers
  - a. He hasn't yet started to pray for them!

# C. Content and Purpose

- 1. Content of Prayer
- 2. Philippians 1:9 (ESV)
  - a. 9 And it is my prayer
  - b. that your love may abound more and more,
  - c. with knowledge and all discernment...
- 3. **Prayer = request** 
  - a. Paul's intercession
- 4. Love = agape
  - a. Willful love; decision based
- 5. Abound = exceeding a fixed measure; overflowing
  - a. Word used for a flower coming into full bloom
- 6. Knowledge = epignosis
  - a. Strengthened form of gnosis
  - b. Full or complete knowledge, intimacy
  - c. Participatory, relational knowledge
- 7. Discernment = aisthesis
  - a. Moral discernment discriminate between good and bad
  - b. Organs of discernment need to be trained to function
- 8. Observations
  - a. Paul doesn't desire a mushy, romanticized love
  - b. Paul desires they have a love with knowledge, depth of insight, discernment
  - c. Requires spending time with each other
    - (1) That means being together in person!
- 9. Purpose of Prayer
- 10. Philippians 1:10 (ESV) —

- a. 10 so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ...
- 11. Approve what is excellent
  - a. Approve = dokimos, discern; used of metals
  - b. Excellent = diaphero; that which is essential in fulfilling the law or Christian life; implies setting priorities (bad, good, better, best)
    - (1) One of the great sins of the contemporary church not doing things expressly forbidden, but neglecting the best
- 12. Pure = heilikrines found pure when unfolded and examined by the sun's light (heile = sun's rays; krino to test)
- 13. Blameless = aproskopos not giving offense; when under the microscope, nothing is found
- 14. For the day of Christ = time when Christ brings to light all that is hidden
- 15. Cf references to day of Christ
  - a. V 6 Paul is confident that God will complete what He started until that day
  - b. Vv 9-10 indicates how God will do this
    - (1) Abound in knowledgeable love
    - (2) Approve what is excellent
    - (3) Pure and blameless (sanctification)
  - c. Paul is confident in what God is doing, and he prays specifically toward that end
    - (1) Your kingdom come, Your will be done...
- 16. Philippians 1:11 (ESV)
  - a. 11 filled with the fruit of righteousness
  - b. that comes through Jesus Christ,
  - c. to the glory and praise of God.
- 17. Filled with fruit of righteousness end result, or fruit of this love and discernment of what is excellent
  - a. Implication is that to lack these things will be to display unrighteousness
- 18. That comes through Jesus Christ means of producing fruit
  - a. Christ in you, the hope of glory
  - b. Christ is our sanctifier!
- 19. To glory and praise of God ultimate purpose
  - a. Remember God began the work; God will complete the work
  - b. Paul prays to that end so God will be glorified
    - (1) Hallowed be Thy name!
